






Army Attachment Camp 2019 Meerut Cantt

umphs. I am talking about Rajputana Rifles. Our college had got 10 vacancies for this camp. 4 of

my seniors from third year and 6 of my fellow comrades from second year including me packed our bags for the camp. The camp was of 15 days from 1 September to 15 September 2019. I was guite thrilled and happy that I'll be going for the army attachment camp and will be having fun there. On the very first day of our arrival, they allotted us beds and barracks for our stay. Nearly 500 cadets had come for the camp and hence we were divided into companies of 100 cadets each. Me and my fellow comrades from my college were given BRAVO Company. The day used to begin early for us as we used to get up at 4:00 AM and assemble in the main PT ground for reporting and attendance. At 5:30 we used to start our morning run of 5-6 KMs followed by PT. This used to last till 8:30 AM after which we had bath time and breakfast. After breakfast, our regular lectures were conducted on different subjects including map reading, weapon training, field and battle craft and so on.

The lectures would be till 2:30 PM after which we had lunchtime followed by a brief rest period till 4:00 PM. We played different sports daily in the evening and the day used to end with a 6 KM evening run. Our training officer in-charge was Major Mohit Sassan. He was very generous and kind and had planned so many activities for us. He also planned visits to different places for us. We went to the Dogra temple, the artillery regiment, the armoured regiment, Remount and veterinary Corps, the engineer regiment. They excellently displayed us their work through mock drills and I was totally awestruck at how quickly they prepared themselves into combat kind of situations. It was because of unity and uniform in command as well as in work that this was possible for them. Sports tournaments were

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My company won the football and volleyball tournaments and I was part of the volleyball team. Moreover, we also went on night marches in full uniform on two separate days. The night march used to be of 15 Km. We were also lucky enough to try ourselves on the obstacle training course. Rajputana rifles also organised a seminar on the issue of militancy in Jammu and Kashmir and covered topics like-'what could be the reason for the militancy' and 'how army handles situation during violent protests when it spirals out of control of the CAPF'.

On 14 September that would be our last night in the camp, we had DJ night and cultural night and we all enjoyed that very much because it was the last day of our camp we didn't know whether we will come again or meet with the same cadets from other colleges and the instructors of the regiment again. We got to know about many things about our buddies like- 'what they think about us' and 'what you think about them'. After staying in close proximity with our nation's soldiers I can say that army life is not as easy as others perceive it to be. Skiing Basic Course 2020 Gulmarg, Kashmir

I have always been passionate about adventure activities like trekking, mountaineering and rock climbing. So, when I got a chance to go for the Skiing basic course to be held in Gulmarg, Kashmir, I was exhilarated. The camp was organized by Indian Institute of Skiing and Mountaineering which is run by the government of India and comes under ministry of tourism. Each year, they organize four to six courses of 15 days each depending on the weather conditions.

My batch was to start from 3 January 2020 and would have been over by 16 January 2020. I packed my bags with all necessary winter equipment and booked the flight tickets for Srinagar. The camp's fee was of Rs 7000 for the accommodation for 15 days in the institute which is totally centrally heated. The fee included everything- Food, rooms, ski equipment and safety equipment. The only thing we had to pay apart from this was the travelling cost.

On 3 January 2020, I arrived at the Srinagar airport around 11:30 AM. I had been in contact with a local taxi driver, Bashir who took me from Srinagar to Gulmarg. The scene in the valley was just a little mixture of calm and tense. The Para-military was deployed and I saw convoy of around 40-50 military vehicles on my way to Gulmarg. Upon reaching at the institute, I was allocated a room which I would be sharing with five other people. Our daily routine would be waking up at 6 AM as we were served bed tea, after that we would get ready and freshen up to go for breakfast at 7:30-8:30 AM. After breakfast, our training used to commence from 8:45 AM and would go on without a break till 1:50. The training was being done on a steep slope which was 2-3 Km away from the institute so; we had to walk in the snow each day to that location while carrying our ski equipment. Our instructors were very helpful and taught us well. I learnt almost every technique they taught in the basic course like, snowplough, snowplough turn, basic swing, uphill swing and free skiing! At 2:00 PM, we would go back to the institute to have lunch and would be back on the slope by 2:30 to continue practicing till 4:30 in the evening. After that we would go back to our rooms and rest till 7 in the evening. Meanwhile, we would be served biscuits and Kahwa 'One of the main attractions of Kashmir'. At 7 PM we used to attend conference each day and discussed various topics related to what we were learning.

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The institute is situated right next to High altitude Warfare School (H.A.W.S.) which is run by the Indian army. I even had the opportunity to interact with the Trainers of H.A.W.S. and the Trainees.

A single course of skiing has around 80 people that come to learn and complete basic, intermediate or advance training. We learn from different instructors depending on our course level. Mostly the people there come from nearby local areas like Anantnag, Baramulla, Pulwama, Srinagar and Kupwara. People from areas of south Kashmir that experience most militancy had come for this course. The course went on smoothly. On 16 January, me and 3 of my roommates left early in the morning at about 6:40 for Srinagar. My flight was scheduled to leave for Delhi at 5:30. However, as we reached the airport, we all got notified that our flights had been cancelled and so we went to the Old airfield station which is adjacent to the airport and is now an Indian air force station. Out of three people that were with me, two were brothers and their father was a colonel in the Signal corps so, that's how we got accommodation for one day in the officer's mess at the air force station. The next day, both the brothers left for Delhi as their flights had got rescheduled while I along with my friend, who is a lawyer by profession, left for Badgam railway station. We boarded a train to Banihaal. The Route of the train goes from some infamous militancy prone areas so, knowing this was a thrill on its own. In the train, we were sitting with some people who we found out were actually from CRPF and were purposely dressed in civils and had covered their face with balaclavas. They warned us of the volatile situation in Kashmir as me and my friend were wearing combat boots and camo pants.

Upon reaching Banihaal, we took a cab for Jammu. I however got down at Reasi as I had decided to stay the night at a friend's house. After staying one day in Reasi, I went to the Jammu railway station the next day and boarded the Duronto Express for Delhi. That's how my adventurous journey came to an end.









Para-Sailing (PM Rally) 2019

Among the many camps that I have attended, PM Rally (Para Sailing) Camp is one of the most memorable camp of my life. I would like to share this beautiful experience.

Cadets from all over Delhi had come for selections of para-sailing. The criteria for selection were 100 metre sprint and through my diligent efforts I got selected. The camp was scheduled from 17 December

to 24 December 2019. Our day used to start with roll

DCAC Volleyball team 2019-20
